



BEING A SAFE RIDER

– SAFE PLACES TO RIDE

Discussion questions:

- Where do you go riding?
- Why do you think an adult is riding with the children?
- Is it safe to ride on the path at a park?
- Why is it dangerous to ride on the road?
- Where else can you ride your bike or scooter?
- Where are the children riding?
- Why are driveways dangerous for riders?
- What do they need to do before crossing driveways?
- Why are they riding behind each other?
- Why are they keeping left?
- Why do they have bells on their bikes?
- Are these safe places to play / ride?
- Where do you play / ride that is safe?
- Would the road be a safe place to ride / play?
- Would the driveway of your house be a safe place to ride / play?
- Why do they all have shoes on?

Key messages:

- **Play safely** and choose safe places to ride such as shared paths and parks.
- **Look for moving cars** when riding past driveways check for vehicles coming or going.
- **Use your bell** to warn other path users that you are near them.
- **Always ride with an adult present** in case you need help.
- **Protect yourself** and choose enclosed shoes, long sleeves, long pants, and knee and elbow pads.

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
