



BEING A SAFE PASSENGER – SAFETY DOOR

Discussion questions:

Getting out of the car

- Tell me what you can see in the picture.
- Who helps you get out of the car?
- Why is it safer to wait until an adult can help you get out of the car?
- Tell me what you do when mum or dad is getting others out of the car or locking up the car.
Stand next to the car on the footpath side – hold the pram or car.
- Why is this door the best one for getting out of the car? *This is a Safety Door, it is on the footpath side and isn't next to traffic.*
- What might happen if the children got out on the other side of the car?

Getting in the car

- Which door is the safest door to use when you get in (and out) of the car?
- Tell me what you do when you get in the car.
- Where is the best place for you to sit in the car?
- What do you think the children would be using to keep themselves safe while they are travelling in the car? What do you use?

Key messages:

- **Stay close** and always hold the hand of a trusted adult or hold their clothes, a bag, side of a pram or wheelchair, when getting into and out of cars in and around other traffic environments.
- **Use the safety door** to enter and exit a vehicle, this is the rear door closest to the kerb.

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
