

## **Becoming work ready** Employment rights, pay and entitlements

Every worker needs to be aware of the employment laws that create their workplace rights, protections and obligations. Industrial relations is the management of work-related obligations and entitlements between employers and their employees.

In Western Australia there are 2 industrial relations systems that provide employees with rights and protections. Both systems have similar, but different laws, processes and standards for employment, pay and conditions.

For an individual employee, only one industrial relations system will apply. This is decided by the employer's business structure. Employers can provide this information when asked.

There is a minimum age of employment in Western Australia.

The employment rights include **minimum rates of pay** for adults, juniors and apprentices.

Junior pay rates	https://www.fairwork.gov.au/pay-and-wages/minimum-wages/junior-pay-rates A junior worker is an employee under 21 years old. Many awards or agreements include an age based junior worker pay rate as a percentage of the adult rate, otherwise juniors are paid the same as adults.
Other payments	<ul> <li><u>https://www.fairwork.gov.au/pay-and-wages/penalty-rates-allowances-and-other-payments/</u></li> <li>There are additional payments that apply in specific situations. <ul> <li>Penalty rates: work completed at night, on weekends or public holidays.</li> <li>Overtime: work completed at an agreed time in addition to normal hours.</li> <li>Allowances: for tasks, skills, use of tools or expenses.</li> <li>Loading: for employment types and entitlements.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Entitlements	
Minimum employment entitlements	<ul> <li>There are minimum employment entitlements for work.</li> <li>State: <u>https://www.commerce.wa.gov.au/labour-relations</u></li> <li>National: <u>https://www.fairwork.gov.au/employment-conditions/national-employment-standards</u></li> <li>For full time employees, further minimum employment entitlements include: <ul> <li>maximum hours of work are 38 hours per week</li> <li>additional hours must be reasonable and paid as overtime</li> <li>rate of pay on leave is the current rate of pay</li> <li>flexible work arrangements can be requested for a variety of reasons</li> <li>notice of significant change to a job role</li> <li>notice of ending an employment relationship</li> <li>final payment of all outstanding entitlements.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
Minimum leave entitlement	<ul> <li>Leave is time away from work that can be taken for a number of reasons.</li> <li>State: <u>https://www.commerce.wa.gov.au/labour-relations/annual-personal-and-other-leave</u></li> <li>National: <u>https://www.fairwork.gov.au/leave</u></li> </ul> For full time employees, the minimum leave entitlements are: <ul> <li>annual leave of four weeks for each year of service</li> <li>personal, sick or carers leave of 10 days for each year of service</li> <li>public holiday leave of approximately 11 days each year</li> <li>compassionate or bereavement leave of 2 days for immediate family</li> <li>parental leave of 12 months unpaid and a further 12 months unpaid</li> <li>family and domestic violence leave of 5 to 10 days each year</li> <li>community service leave is unpaid except for jury duty.</li> </ul>
Long service leave	https://www.commerce.wa.gov.au/labour-relations/long-service-leave-0Long service leave is an entitlement for almost 9 weeks paid leave after continuous employment with the same employer for 10 years.https://www.wa.gov.au/organisation/myleave-construction-long-service-waOnsite building and construction industry employees have portable long service leave and keep their entitlement when they move projects or employers.
Casual employment entitlements	https://www.fairwork.gov.au/starting-employment/types-of-employees/casual- employees/becoming-a-permanent-employee Casual employees have fewer entitlements than full time employees. They have a pathway into permanent employment known as <b>casual conversion</b> .

The minimum employment entitlements require employees to be **paid in money, directly into a bank account, at least monthly,** agree to any **pay deductions** and receive a **pay slip.** 

Getting paid	
Provide bank details	Choose a bank account and provide the bank details to the employer. The bank details are the account name, BSB number and account number.

There is support available for workers with concerns about their pay and entitlements.

Pay concerns	
Unpaid work	<ul> <li><u>https://www.fairwork.gov.au/starting-employment/unpaid-work</u></li> <li>Students on work experience or internships approved by their school, training organisation or university can be unpaid for short periods of time.</li> <li>Job applicants demonstrating their skills relevant to a vacant job and being evaluated for that job in a short work trial can be unpaid.</li> <li>Employees in job-required training, attending team meetings or on opening or closing shifts are entitled to the appropriate pay and conditions.</li> </ul>

Workers have protection from actions being taken after using their rights or protected actions.
