

Becoming work ready Career planning

Career planning reflects choices, decisions and transition points over a lifetime. Early career planning uses the knowledge of an individual's skills, qualities, motivations, career and personal goals to create a plan.

A career plan often involves steps, such as:

- trialling different types of jobs, work or careers through work experience
- choosing further education or training to gain the skills, knowledge and qualifications
- entering the workforce at an entry level, while learning or with a qualification
- upskilling to develop the knowledge, skills and attitudes to meet career goals.

Work placement learning and work experience is available to secondary students as well as vocational and higher education students. Look for high quality learning experiences that offer a realistic and engaging insight into an industry, job or career.

Support is available to help young people transition from secondary school into vocational education and training (VET) programs. Some learning programs focus on developing skills in workforce shortage areas, which is helpful for young people (and parents or carers) who are seeking reassurance that they will find a job after training. Upskilling might include informal learning programs to develop the knowledge, skills and attitudes required to meet personal and career goals.

Apprenticeship or traineeship pathways are a structured VET study arrangement combined with paid on-the-job training. There are formal requirements to meet: there must be an apprentice or trainee, an eligible qualification, an employer, an RTO and an Australian Apprentice Support Network provider and a completed Training Contract.

Some programs are offered to secondary school students.
